Gambling in America on the Rise!

But **morally**, gambling is a tremendous problem. According to the National Council on Problem Gambling (NCPG), 6 million adults and half a million teens have a problem gambling. The annual cost associated with gambling (crime, addiction, bankruptcy) is \$17 billion in America. Approximately 76% of problem gamblers are likely to have a major depressive disorder. Children of problem gamblers are at higher risk for numerous behavioral disorders.

Biblically, the case against gambling is that it is "theft by consent." Just because the participants are willing does not justify it. A common analogy is the old-fashioned duel. Just because two men agree to a duel where one or both may be shot and killed does not make it any less murder! Gambling violates the Golden Rule.

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
