Are You Looking Ahead?

Any time you go for a walk, whether a saunter in your own neighborhood, a stroll through the woods, or a hike along some nature trail, you need not only to watch the path that's under your feet; you need to look ahead! Their priorities are so mixed up that they never give much thought to spiritual things — their souls, the will of God, faith in Christ, honoring the Father, following His Son, reading the Bible, prayer, worship, service to others, the spiritual condition of the souls around them.

But the apostle, Paul, certainly **was** (1 Corinthians 9:27; Titus 2:13-14; 2 Timothy 1:12; 4:6-8).
