Tips For Effective Listening

ur speaker for the week has spent hours preparing each lesson, has dedicated his life to the effective presentation of God's Word, and will do the best job he can of enthusiastically share the Message with us. Are you prepared to listen well? Here are a few tips on hearing well. It does take some effort.

1. Be attentive, Nehemiah 8:1-3; Acts 2:14; Luke 19:47-48

Ask questions like: (1) What is the **purpose** of this particular message? (2) What is the main point? (3) What proof is being offered? (4) What will this mean to me today? (5) Do I need to change something in my life?

2. Be reverent, Hebrews 12:28; Matthew 13:15; Acts 13:46

At every assembly, be aware that you are in the presence of God! This is not a sporting event, a social gathering, or a school function. God is with us, and we are to serve Him with reverence and godly fear. If the message is presented accurately from God's Word, then God is speaking to us. What is He saying to you?

3. Be honest, 1 Samuel 3:10; Matthew 13:15; Acts 13:46

We can judge ourselves to be unworthy of everlasting life by our failure to carefully listen and honestly apply the message to ourselves. *"Hearing"* God's Word is more than letting the speaker's words fall on our ear drums! It involves hearing, considering, accepting, believing, and obeying.

4. Make a personal application, 2 Samuel 12:1-7

David understood clearly the parable of Nathan, but he failed to see himself in it! Ask yourself humbly when being convicted by God's Word: "Am I the one?" If so, do something about it. If you need to correct a bad attitude, then change it. If you need to repent of a sin, repent and pray God for forgiveness. Don't wait until time and opportunity have passed you by. Satan always wants you to wait for a more convenient season. Today is the best day to hear and obey.

5. Be obedient, James 1:21-25

The Word heard, believed but not practiced is *worthless* to our lives. It may take time. It may require sacrifice. But humbly obeying God's Word is worth every bit of effort put forth. *"But grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ,"* **2 Peter 3:18**.
