With hope we have an anchor which gives stability to our lives. Calvin saw a connection between faith and hope and called hope "perseverance, in faith." Whatever you call it, it's a necessity. Life without hope is no life at all.

And then there is the necessity of **love**. It is like breathing. Breathing is not a duty; it is a necessity. We breathe or we suffocate. Loving is the key to life, said Jesus. Love God; love your fellowman. A life without love — forget it. There's no such thing. Babies die without love, and so do we. We must receive love, and we must give love, or we will wither on the vine.
