... And when they had mocked him, they took off from him the robe, and put on him his garments, and led him away to crucify him" (Matt. 27:26-31).

At Golgotha, the place of the crucifixion: "Golgotha" which means "the place of the skull," was outside the city of Jerusalem, probably on the north side. All four writers state, simply, "then He was crucified" (Matt. 27:35; Mk. 15:24; Lk. 23:33; Jn. 19:18), without giving the details involved in such an execution. First century readers knew all too well. The body was suspended on a heavy, rough wooden structure by four large spike-like nails driven through hands and feet. The pain was horribly excruciating and affected the entire body in a variety of cruel ways; it usually lasted for a few days before death came. "And they that passed by railed on him, wagging their heads, and saying, Thou that destroyest the temple, and buildest it in three days, save thyself: if thou art the Son of God, come down from the cross. In like manner also the chief priests mocking him, with the scribes and elders, said, He saved others; himself he cannot save. He is the King of Israel; let him now come down from the cross, and we will believe on him. He trusteth on God; let him deliver him now, if he desireth him: for he said, I am the Son of God. And the robbers also that were crucified with him cast upon him the same reproach" (Matt. 27:39-44). And, as if all this were not enough, that He might truly bear the guilt of our sins and become an all-sufficient Savior for us, this had to happen: "And about the ninth hour Jesus cried with a loud voice, saying, Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani? that is, My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" (Matt. 27:46). Four verses later, His death.

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
