Rejection

"But they have not all obeyed the gospel. For Isaiah says, 'LORD, who has **believed** our report?" (Rom. 10:16; Is. 53:1). Isaiah understood **rejection**! As God's prophet, not everybody believed what Isaiah had to say! In Paul's day, he understood Isaiah's **rejection**. In my day, I understand their **rejection!** Perhaps prophets and preachers shouldn't take it *personally*, but we do.

When Samuel complained to the Lord that they had **rejected him** as their judge, Jehovah said to him: "...for they have not rejected you, but they have rejected Me, that I should not reign over them" (1 Sam. 8:7). Did that make Samuel feel better? I doubt it. He still took the rejection personally, and when he realized that the people were snubbing God instead, that would have been even worse! However, there is a lesson here for both preacher and his audience. When you reject a sound sermon, then you are rejecting God, not the preacher.

So what was Isaiah to do when Israel rejected his message? Keep on preaching it! Paul wrote in Romans 10:17, "So then faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God." **So** is an adverb of manner — in this manner faith comes! The one who rejects it is in trouble — not the messenger, not the message, and certainly not God!

God does not intend to save the rebellious, stubborn, hard-hearted people. He intends to save those whose honest, sincere hearts are affected by the Gospel! "For since, in the wisdom of God, the world through wisdom did not know God, it pleased God through the foolishness of the message preached to save those who believe" (1 Cor. 1:21). If that doesn't work, then there is not much left to be done.

Romans 10:18 states further that the Gospel has been sent to the whole world. Everyone has the opportunity to believe and be saved, or not believe and be lost. It's a sobering thought, isn't it?

Robertson's *Word Pictures in the New Testament* says: "They heard, but they did not heed. Some disbelieve now (Rom. 3:3) as they did then" (IV:390). Nothing has changed in the last three thousand years! Rejection of God's Word is more prevalent than acceptance -- even by those who claim to be God's people!

God tried to provoke Israel to jealousy in the saving of the Gentiles, and perhaps this caused a few to *reconsider* the message (Rom. 10:19-21). But by and large Israel was a "disobedient and gainsaying people" (Rom. 10:21). Shame on them, and on us, if we reject the whole counsel of God!
