God's Wisdom: Eldership

"So when they had appointed elders in every church, and prayed with fasting, they commended them to the Lord in whom they had believed" — Acts 14:23.

God ordained in His church that the spiritual leaders be in the **plural** — "elders." Religious people and bodies have ignored that arrangement to their own detriment. We see one of the first apostasies from the New Testament order in **organization**: one elder was given primacy over the other elders in a local congregation and designated as "bishop." This man then represented the church, but in so doing violated God's order.

Some denominations today have a "pastor system" of government. They designate their preacher as "pastor" and give him *some* of the authority God intended for the eldership alone. However well-intentioned the plan may be, it is dangerous in that it permits **one man** to rule the church contrary to God's plan. Doctrinal apostasy often results from following the influence of that one person.

In the New Testament, **Diotrephes** became a "one-man show" in the church to which the beloved apostle John wrote. John said that "he loves to have the preeminence among them" (3 Jn. 9). This heretic even rejected the apostle John, or anyone who would be in fellowship with John, putting them out of the church (3 Jn. 10).

Some *carnal* Christians in Corinth touted their favorite teacher — Paul, Apollos, Cephas, etc. (1 Cor. 1:12). Once again we see the danger of following one man to the spiritual detriment of the saints. Paul warned against thinking of men "beyond what is written, that none of you may be puffed up on behalf of one against another" (1 Cor. 4:6).

God's wisdom is seen in *the plurality of men* that compose the eldership in the local church. Their **combined** wisdom and judgment protects the church from being led astray from the truth, or from becoming the *"bewitched"* (Gal. 3:1) who no longer obey the truth. So brethren, trust in God's plan and Word, and do not be puffed up for a one-man show!
