## Some Things We Do **Not** Believe About Baptism

- 1. That baptism can be administered by sprinkling or pouring of water upon a person.
- 2. That infants need to be baptized or that infant baptism is acceptable to God.
- 3. That baptism is a "Sacrament" ("an outward sign, instituted by Christ to give grace" The Baltimore Catechism No. 2., p. 39; "a sacrament is not fulfilled by the fact that one believes in it, but by the fact that it is made"— A Catholic Dictionary, p. 441).
- 4. That baptism **alone** will benefit or save anyone.
- 5. That water can wash away or take away sins.
- 6. That the validity of baptism depends upon who administers it.
- 7. That the validity of baptism depends upon whether or not *the right formula* is spoken at the time one is baptized.
- 8. That anyone is justified, pardoned, forgiven or saved before he is baptized.
- 9. That baptism is a symbol of one's having been already forgiven or saved (or that baptism is "an outward sign of an inward grace").
- 10. That baptism is a symbol of one's dedication or commitment to do the will of God.
- 11. That baptism in the Holy Spirit was ever commanded by God or administered by any man.
- 12. That baptism in the Holy Spirit is available to anyone today.

## Some Things We **Do** Believe About Baptism

- 1. That baptism is administered by immersing one in water (Matthew 3:16; Acts 8:38; 10:47-48; Romans 6:3-4; Colossians 2:12).
- 2. That only accountable people who are lost in sin and desire salvation can be acceptably baptized (Acts 2:36-38; 8:35-38).
- 3. That baptism is a command of Christ (Matthew 28:19; Mark 16:15-16; Acts 10:48).
- 4. That baptism must be *preceded* by hearing the gospel of Christ, believing in Christ, repenting of one's sins, and confessing Christ as God's Son (Mark 16:15-16; Matthew 28:19; Acts 2:37-38, 41; 8:35-38; 18:8) or it avails nothing.
- 5. That God through the sacrifice of His Son takes away our sins (forgives us, saves us), but **not** until we are baptized in water as He commands (Acts 22:16; Romans 6:3-4; 1 Peter 3:21).
- 6. That the validity of baptism depends upon the understanding, faith and obedience of the one baptized (Acts 19:1-5).
- 7. That one is justified, pardoned, forgiven when he is baptized and not until he is baptized. Baptism is essential to discipleship (Matthew 28:19), to salvation (Mark 16:15-16; 1 Peter 3:21), to the washing away of sins (Acts 22:16), to entering Christ (Galatians 3:26-27), to entering the death of Christ and our death to sin (Romans 6:3-4), to entering the spiritual body of Christ, the church (1 Corinthians 12:13; Acts 2:47).
- 8. That baptism is, *in a figure*, a burial and a resurrection and is *likened* to the burial and resurrection of Christ (Romans 6:3-4; Colossians 2:12; 3:1).
- 9. That baptism is a "true likeness," "the like figure," "the antitype" of the salvation of the eight souls in the ark by water (1 Peter 3:20-21).
- 10. That baptism brings the beginning of a new life in Christ as a new creature (Romans 6).
- 11. That baptism in the Holy Spirit was promised to some in the first century (Matthew 3:11; Acts 1:4-5; John 14:25-26; 16:12-13), and administered by God directly from heaven (Acts 2:1-4; 10:44-46; 11:15-16). No man ever baptized anyone in the Holy Spirit.
- 12. That baptism in the Holy Spirit was limited to a few in the first century and confined to the New Testament period of miracles (1 Corinthians 13:8-10). **303602**
