## Betrayed!

Have you ever been **totally betrayed** by a close friend, family member, or someone in whom you had complete confidence? If so, then you have felt the **enormous pain and anguish** it causes. But God defeated the advice of Ahithophel when he aided Absalom, and so Ahithophel went out and hung himself rather than face King David in his betrayal (2 Sam. 17:23)!

Dear reader, do not ever become a "Judas" to the Cause of Christ! The Hebrew writer said that those who turned their backs on the truth and the kingdom of God "crucified to themselves the Son of God afresh and put Him to an open shame!" (Heb. 6:6, KJV). That is what brethren today are doing when they try to modernize their theology to comport with current trends. Glorying in their shame may well describe their actions, but as Paul wrote "whose end is destruction, and whose god is their belly" (Phil. 3:19).

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
