Even so, every good tree bears good fruit, but a bad tree bears bad fruit. A good tree cannot bear bad fruit, nor can a bad tree bear good fruit. Every tree that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire. Therefore by their fruits you will know them." (Matthew 7:16-20).

Jesus has called us to be different from the world and to appear different from the worldly.

Are we *acting* like sheep, following the lead of our loving Shepherd, or do our actions disguise as as wolves?
